WELCOME

TO ALL NEW PARISHIONERS AND VISITORS

We all know how upsetting and frustrating it is to lose something; car keys or our mobile phone. We search and look for them until we find them and there is a sense of relief and even joy when we find them. We might even go and tell others we have found what we had lost.

The gospel this Sunday puts before us the experience of being lost and found by God. Jesus uses not one but three images to describe for us the lengths God goes to in order find us when we ourselves are lost. The parables also describes how God rejoices when we are found.

The shepherd, the woman and the father all have in common losing, searching, finding and celebrating. Each of them had lost something that was precious to them and how happy they were when they had found it!

In the gospel, Jesus is in the company of those he feels happiest with; the tax collectors and sinners. But typically the self-righteous Pharisees lodge their formal complaint, *'look this man even eats with sinners.'* While they complain, the sinners are happy to sit and enjoy the company of Jesus. Jesus takes this opportunity to tell them some stories in which both groups are represented. He shares with them the parable of the lost sheep, the lost coin, and the infamous lost son. He presents them with these deeply tender images of God to show that whenever we stray from God's compassion and love, (being lost), God always searches for us in order to find us, heal us and bring us home.



All we have to do is realize and admit that sometimes we do wander off and get lost. We are asked to recognize our need for God, and then begin our journey home where God will rejoice and celebrate. The shepherd, the woman and the father went to great lengths to find what they had lost. They never gave up until they found their most precious belonging. God never gives up on us. God loves each of us personally, passionately and intimately. When we can admit and recognize that we have lost our way, God comes running to find us. Like the father, *God sees us coming a way long off, is moved to pity, clasps his arms around us and kisses us tenderly.* God rejoices when we return to home to where we belong. In the Old Testament, the Prophet Zephaniah describes God with this powerful image, *'God is in our midst, he will exult with joy over you' he will renew you by his love; he will dance with shouts of joy for you as on a day of festival.'* Our God is a dancing, forgiving and compassionate God. May we waste no more time in being lost and hurry home to join in the feast and celebration. Our God is waiting is for us!

**Forgive and Forgive Again**

Last Sunday's readings reminded us of the responsibility we have to those we hurt and those who hurt us. No effort is to be spared in the pursuit of reconciliation and forgiveness. All three readings this Sunday, especially the gospel continue this message and make this point very clearly.

While naming and highlighting all the negative things that lead to sin and division, the first reading also tells us to, *'forgive your neighbor the hurt that is done to you....' do not bear your neighbor ill-will.* The second reading puts our relationship and connection with each other very plainly; *the life and death of each of us has its influence on others...* What I say, how I speak and how I treat others have the power to build them up or tear them down. Our words and our actions can sometimes be weapons of mass destruction. The choice is ours, as to how we treat others.

Peter is the one who in the gospel asks Jesus, *'Lord, how often must I forgive my neighbor if they wrong me? As often as seven times?'* Jesus replies without any hesitation, *'Not seven times I tell you, but seventy-seven times.'* In this answer, Jesus is not giving us a number of times that we are to forgive others. At the time of Jesus the phrase *seventy-seven times* meant *without end*. So Jesus is telling Peter and us today that there is to be no end to our forgiving of others. For the Christian, forgiveness is not something that is done occasionally; it is to be part of our lives and a way of living.



As God freely forgives us, we are called, difficult as it maybe to forgive those who have hurt us. Jesus uses the story of the ungrateful servant to highlight this. The king is freely gracious in his forgiveness of his servant. This same servant behaved in completely the opposite way. He is hard and unforgiving with another servant who is in debt to him.

Hard as this may be for us, we are asked to try to be as forgiving as the king in the gospel is, and not to be cold and hard-hearted like the servant.

God does not forgive us once; we are continually forgiven in and through Jesus. We need to develop a relationship with God that teaches us that God loves us as we are; as sinners. We are loved sinners. Hopefully we will come to realize and appreciate that faith is not just about teaching us how to live; faith is about teaching us how to live again, and again and again.

## REQUIREMENTS PRIOR TO THE BAPTISM OF YOUR CHILD

In order to baptize your child in our parish, the following documents are required before you begin the process.

1. Formal parish registration form
2. Formal baptism request form must be completed by the parents.
3. Copy of the Catholic parent's baptismal record.
4. Only one godparents needs to be a practicing Catholic, and must have received the sacraments of baptism, eucharist and confirmation.
5. The Catholic godparent must obtain a letter from the pastor stating that he or she is attending regular weekly Mass and they are regular practicing Catholics.

Once all the documents have been received you, will be notified when the next baptism preparation class will be. After the class you will be notified when the next date is available for the Sacrament of Baptism for your child.

## Holy Land Traditional Wares



**PLEASE STOP BY THE TABLES OF RELIGIOUS WARES** (Nativity set, rosaries, statues, crucifixes, charms, etc.) **AFTER ALL THE MASSES THE WEEK END OF (September 26 & 27)** inside the Parish Vestibule. Ayman Khair is representing about 180 Christian families from Bethlehem. These families have been dependent upon sales of their hand carved religious articles to tourists of the Holy Land. Due to the conflict in the Middle East and the pandemic, tourism has been stopped completely. It is very important to support them at this critical time, since they have no income and there is no government to take care of them and help them. In order to survive, they have turned to Christian communities in the United State to purchase their articles. These hand carved religious articles are beyond description. Carved from wood of the sacred Olive tree, this workmanship has been traditional for these families for hundreds of years. It is hoped that through the efforts of Mr. Khair, these families who have little income and are able to stay living and survive in the Holy Land. Sadly enough, the Christian population dropped from 22 % to less than 2% in the last 20 years. Thank you in advance for your support.

## MEMORIALS IN MEMORY OF A LOVED ONE

Occasionally someone will ask me; I would like to donate to something specific for the church in memory of my husband, wife, or someone else. Can you tell me what a contribution for a memorial would be used for and how much would it cost for each item needed for the church? Could I contribute towards the memorial in part if not in full? Here is a list of suggested needs in our parish that could be requested by you to be a memorial in memory of a loved one.

1. New Ciborium (Holy Communion gold vessels used at Mass). The ones we have are badly worn and need to be replaced. It is more expensive to have the ones we have re-gold plated.
2. An automatic bell ringer attachment for our church tower bell to announce the beginning of each weekend Mass as well as announce the hours of the day for reciting the church prayer the “Angelus” which should be recited at 6:00am, noon, and 6:00pm. This is still a traditional practice among many Catholics.
3. A matching chasuble and dalmatic vestment for the priest and deacon, (the outer garment the priest and deacon wear during Mass.) We need sets in green, white, red, and purple for the four traditional colors used at Mass.
4. Liturgical seasonal banners for the walls on both sides of the tabernacle in church.
5. A new sign for the front of the church to display the times of Mass, confessions, etc.
6. A new sign for the front door of the Parish Center to display office hours etc.
