





Reflection for Third Sunday of Lent: Year A
3rd Sunday of Lent
 Fr. Edward Linton

Every Christmas morning, in a parish where I was pastor for many years, we had a reception for homeless people. The parish served a great Christmas lunch to about 150 homeless men, women and children. One Christmas it was especially cold and wet. A long line of homeless people formed outside our hall. I strolled up and down the queue trying to keep up the spirits of those waiting to get in. One man showed me his shoes. They were old and the sole was coming apart from the rest of the shoe. He asked me if I had another pair of shoes for him. I told him I didn't have another pair of shoes, but he should keep on asking because I was certain that someone who was helping with the lunch would definitely have a pair of shoes for him. "You have an angel here," I told him. "You have to find the angel who has your shoes."

As soon as I said this, his frustration began to show. Certainly, you can imagine his frustration: He was living on the streets; it was cold and wet and his shoes were shot. He looked at me and said, "You are just like all the rest; you don't want to do anything for me; you want to pawn me off on someone else." "No," I insisted. "Your angel is here and your angel has your shoes. But I am not your angel." He turned his back on me and mumbled under his breath. A little later I saw a religious sister who worked with me in the parish. Now, you should know that this nun was a small woman. But I thought, what the heck and I asked, "Sr. Barbara, do you happen to have a pair of men's shoes that are about size 11?"

"Well, yes I do," she said to my great surprise. "My nephew just sent me a box of his old shoes."

"Come with me," I said. We went up to the man who needed new shoes and I said, "I've done your work for you! I found your angel!" He began to cry instantly, and he began to apologize for not having more faith on Christmas morning. "Don't cry," I told him. "Be grateful and rejoice because the Lord, himself, is looking out for you!"

Today in the Gospel, we hear that the Lord, himself, went searching for the woman at the well. The woman came to the well weighed down, frustrated and sad, only to discover that the Lord himself was waiting at the well, searching to forgive and save her. How do we experience the Lord searching for us?

In order to experience the Lord searching for us, we must allow ourselves to be pursued. The Samaritan woman from the town of Sychar did not arrive at the well ready to be pursued by the Lord! In fact, she put all sorts of obstacles in the way of Jesus to make it difficult for him to reach out to her with love and forgiveness. When Jesus asked her for water to drink, she replied "How can you, a Jew, ask me, a Samaritan woman, for a drink?" When Jesus said that he could give her living water, she irritably responded, "Sir, you do not even have a bucket and the cistern is deep; where then can you get this living water?" When Jesus then said, "Whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst," the woman poked fun at him. "Sir, give me this water, so that I may not be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water."

The woman did not arrive at the well ready to be pursued. In fact, she arrived with a temperament that made it difficult for the Lord to break through to her. But the Lord would touch her heart by allowing her to speak about what most burdened her. When the Lord told her to go and get her husband, she responded that she had no husband. To which Jesus replied, "You are right in saying, 'I do not have a husband.' For you have had five husbands, and the one you have now is not your husband."

It seems that this woman was searching for love in all the wrong places! Perhaps she was so poor that her only option was to live with a man who would provide for her. Perhaps the price she paid for this was abuse. Perhaps she was a prostitute. We don't know for sure, but certainly, this Samaritan woman was burdened by the life she lived. The Lord pursued her and unburdened her. The Lord pursued her for a purpose! The Father seeks people who worship him in Spirit and Truth to worship him, he told her. The Lord seeks people such as you, he told her! How wonderful this must have sounded to this woman! Others might disrespect her, but the Lord pursued her!

When the Lord breaks through our hardness of heart, we know he is pursuing us! When we acknowledge what burdens us before the Lord, we experience him pursuing us!

The Messiah Before You

If you would have asked me on the morning of my confirmation what the chances were of the Holy Spirit getting into my heart, I would have told you they were about the same as getting water from a stone.

My faith was fragile at this time in my life, primarily because I viewed it as exactly that — my faith. Something within my possession and subject to my own power. And I hadn't done the things I thought I needed to do in order to be the kind of Christian who knows the truth and lives it. I was waiting to be made stronger. I was waiting to be made more faithful. I was waiting for a transformation.

Little did I know, I was like the woman at the well, standing around talking about the coming of the Messiah, unaware that he was standing right in front of me. She wasn't ready; she was still living in her sin. She was caught so unawares that she left her water jar at the well, rushing out to tell what she had seen.

When I was anointed with the oil it no longer mattered that I wasn't strong enough to break open the stone that I was convinced encased my heart — God's grace gushed forth through the cracks. While I certainly didn't become a perfect Christian — and never will, in this life — I did learn that when God tells you to strike, it's probably best not to second-guess Him.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Why does the date of Easter change every year, while most other celebrations are celebrated on the same day?

Answer:

Every feast is celebrated at a certain time for a reason. Saints feast days are commonly the day of their death. While we don't know Jesus' exact birthday, we celebrate the "light of the world" around the time of winter solstice, as dark, wintry days begin to lengthen again. We have a historical clue, however, to when the Easter events occurred. We know that Jesus was crucified the day before Passover. The Jews calculated the date for Passover based on both the solar and lunar calendars. It corresponds to the first full moon after the spring equinox. The early Christians maintained this connection in their celebrations of Easter on the first Sunday after the paschal full moon.

We don't re-calculate the full moon every year. As astronomy developed, so too did the forecasts of when Easter would occur in future years. The Church has created a table of calculated dates, projecting the date of Easter decades in advance. The date of Easter also determines the date of Ash Wednesday and the season of Lent, as well as the feast days following in the Easter season, including Pentecost. So these feasts move, too! This tradition may seem complicated, but it connects our Christian faith now to what has come before — our Jewish roots and the real, historical reality of Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection.



REQUIREMENTS PRIOR TO THE BAPTISM OF YOUR CHILD

In order to baptize your child in our parish, parent(s) please come to the parish office to obtain an outline, describing the necessary requirements - - PRIOR to both the parents and godparents being scheduled to attend a required pre-baptism class:

Parent(s):

1. Must be registered parishioners in our parish.
2. Parent(s) must be baptized and submit a copy of their Confirmation certificate.
3. If the parents are married, provide a copy of their Catholic marriage certificate.
4. Parent(s) must provide a copy of the child's birth certificate.

Godparent(s) At least one:

1. Must be a practicing Catholic, following the teachings of the Catholic faith.
2. The godparent must be baptized and submit a copy of their Confirmation certificate.
3. The godparent, if married, must provide a copy of their Catholic marriage certificate.


Only after receiving the required documentation, and the parent(s) and godparent(s) have attended the pre-baptism class, can the baptism of your child be scheduled.





Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture


When I became the pastor of a large parish, I soon found myself, for the first time in my life, riddled with anxiety, headaches, difficulty making decisions, and fatigue. I called a therapist friend and told her my symptoms and asked if she thought I needed a serious medical exam. She said, "How much water do you drink?" I told her, "I haven't had time to drink water lately." She responded, "You're chronically dehydrated. Drink eighty-five ounces a day and call me in a week." I started guzzling water and in a week all my symptoms went away. I felt great.

Like me, the people in the Exodus wanderings were dehydrated. But unlike me, they knew it. Their symptoms were bad. They fight with each other. They accuse God of being a monster who wants them and their children to die of thirst. Their thirst drives them to plot the bloody assassination of the man who rescued them. God responds by using Moses to strike a rock from which rivers of living waters flow to quench their thirst for years to come.

The Holy Spirit is the living water of love which flows from the pierced side of Jesus, the new Moses. What symptoms in your life suggest you're spiritually dehydrated? Anger at God? Cynicism at your leaders? Bitter rivalry and bickering with others? Don't panic. *Of course* we have those symptoms. Ask God to provide his water to quench your spiritual thirst, and he will. And all those symptoms will soon disappear.


