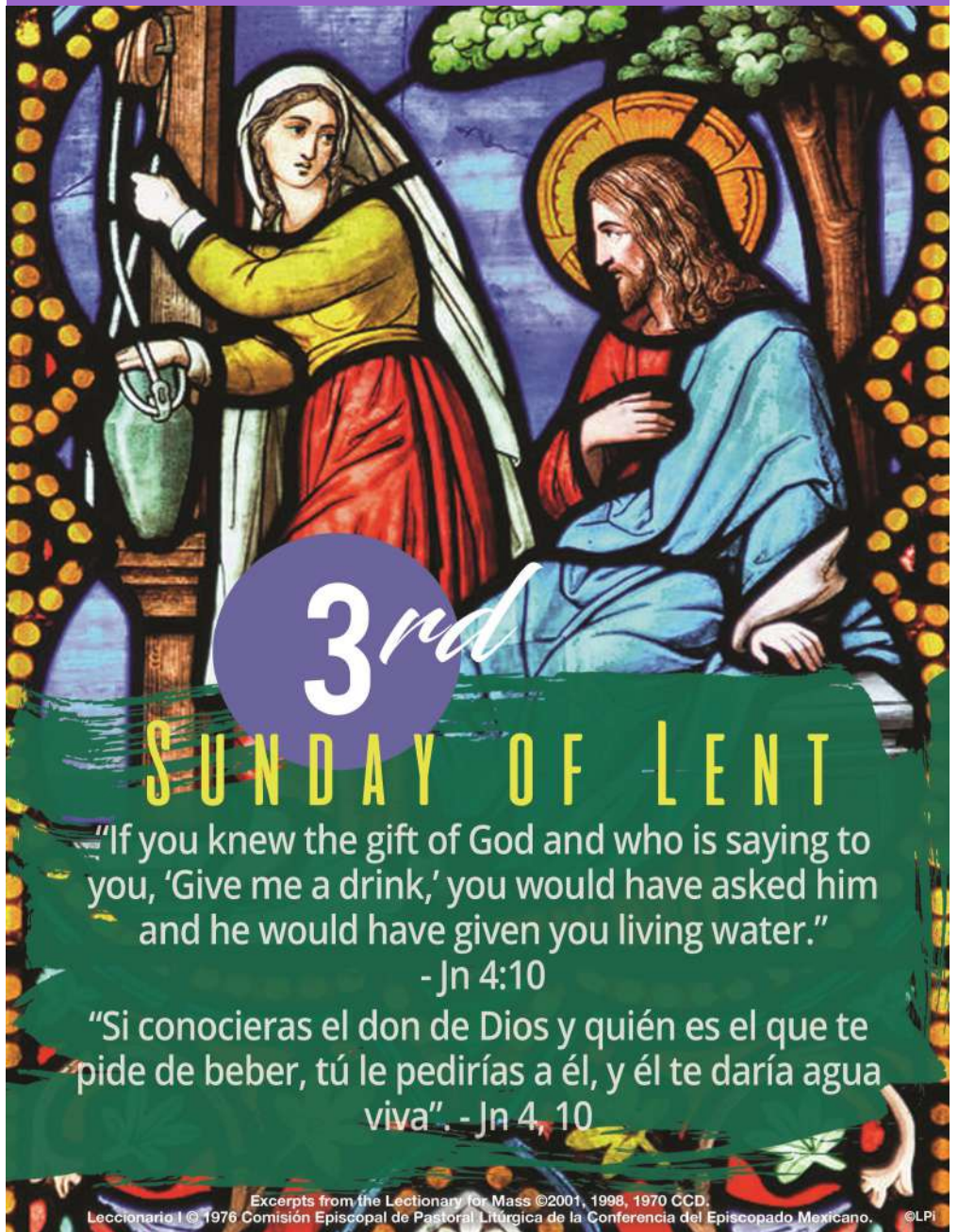

Reflection for the Third Sunday of Lent Time: Year B
Third Sunday of Lent – March 3, 2024

Of the many powerful scenes in the epic biopic *Pope John Paul II*, starring Jon Voight and Cary Elwes, one continually sticks with me. Early in the movie, in a flashback to his childhood, the young Karol falls to the ground and awakes, injured, to his mother's voice of comfort. Here we have a beautiful example of a parent *handing on*, in the truest sense, the Faith of the Church. His mother tells him (and I am paraphrasing), Karol, life is confusing and complicated, God is simple. Let me show you the simple way: "In the Name of the Father, of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

In a way that might not be apparent at first, the simplicity of God is offered to us today through the readings. And in the midst of our Lenten pilgrimage toward Easter, this aspect of simplicity is decisive. What we see throughout all of our readings today is that sin complicates life, but God's Word, which is his Law and Wisdom, is simple and simplifies our life.

In our first reading we see the first instance of the giving of the Law. Here it is simple: ten words of life, a Decalogue, which echo the ten creative words of Genesis. God reveals to his Chosen People the simple logic of His life. These laws reveal how a human person can flourish — how he or she can live a life which reflects God's plan and thereby become recreated in freedom. It is in the second giving of the Law, Deuteronomy, where we will see that humanity complicates the law and needs more clarification.

The psalmist provides an example of a praying soul wrapped up in the simplicity of the Law — the realization that these Words are a gift to us, which take the guesswork out of living a morally upright and fulfilling life. Indeed, the Words of God are words of life, not death.

Further, Paul speaks to this human experience in pointing out that Christ crucified is a stumbling block to the Jews and foolishness to Gentiles; yet for those who have been called, that is, for the Church, the mystery of Christ is actually showing us God's power and wisdom.

In the Gospel we enter the scene of Christ clearing out the Temple — clearing out the confusion of years of human interpretation of the Law, which lost the spirit of the Law and turned the Temple of God into a

marketplace. Christ enters and trims down the excess to remind everyone what the Temple itself is, and adds a simple promise, a promise which his hearers misunderstand because of their complicated conceptions. John clarifies for us: he was speaking about his body when he promised to raise it in three days.

So where does all of this leave us? On one level, we can see an encouragement for us here in the midst of the season of Lent — this time is less about our feats of spiritual strength and more about reducing the distractions and complexities of our lives. Often Lent can be a good time for us all to take a good look at our lives and assess what is actually essential, what actually brings life and draws us closer to God. What have we added which draws us away from the simple and straightforward and adds complexity (that is, our own impositions) into our relationship with God?

Now of course this is not to say that all complexity is bad; rather, complexity which we add by our own ideas and desires is what I am talking about. Depth is different than complexity for its own sake. To grow in deeper relationship with God is to go deeper into the mystery. And that is what God desires for us.

So we can see that on a deeper level, the readings this Sunday invite us into deeper relationship with God, deeper relationship via a simplification of our approach to that relationship. And this dynamic is given words by our Prayer after Communion today, where we will pray for the grace to abide in the love of God and neighbor, so as to fulfill the whole of God's commands.

The simplicity of the Gospel is its deepest challenge. To realize what it means to love God and neighbor with everything we have and are, to live in the depth and simplicity of who God has revealed himself as — these are the essential tasks of the Christian life. And we can see that simple prayer — the sign of the Cross — expresses the simplicity and depth of God's desire for us in one statement and action of the complete mystery of our faith.

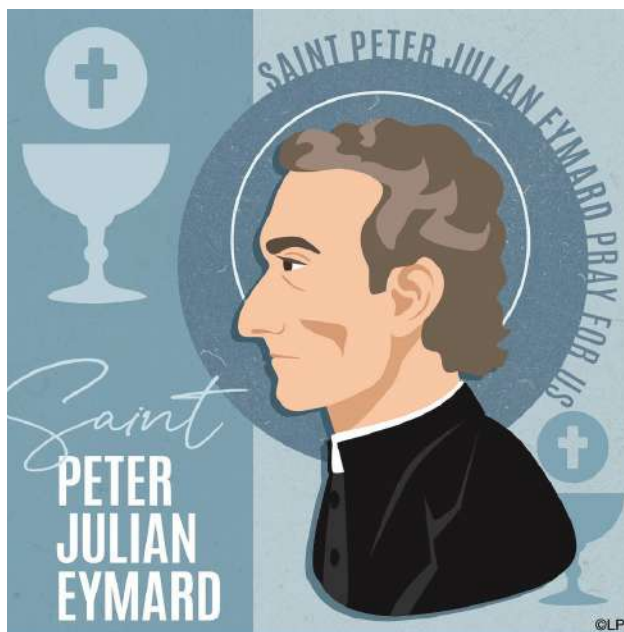

(PRACTICING) CATHOLIC

The Merciful Anger of Jesus

Watch your fellow churchgoers today as the priest or deacon reads the story of Jesus raising hell (or perhaps he's raising heaven?) in the temple square. Dollars to donuts, they'll be squirming.

As Catholics, we have become very uncomfortable with Angry Jesus. He makes us cringe in the same way that the Old Testament God does when He calls Himself "jealous" and talks about punishment. That level of intensity makes us recoil. If it were present in a human relationship, it would be toxic and abusive, because in humanity, fierceness and love rarely coexist in a healthy way.

But what a tragedy it would be for us to mistake our relationship with God for our relationship with our spouse, our best friend, or even our human father. Because we cannot see clearly, we would mistake His zeal for anger and His law for dictat.

The strong and sure movement of a wave against a rocky cliff will, over time, erode its surface, just as an overabundance of raindrops will flood a city. We do not call the water callous and cruel. We still luxuriate in its coolness and refreshment. Its destructive powers don't negate the life-giving properties of water. We do not demand that water apologize to us for being strong.

Fierce, uncompromising — but also, soft and merciful. How can God — and God's law — be both, at the same time? How can Christ cast a whip at someone's foot, overturn a table and scatter coins? How can the law of God be perfect, as the Psalm says, and refresh the soul — while demanding so much of it?

All I can say is, thank God for Angry Jesus. We need his fierceness and thank God it does not wane because it confuses us. Thank God his mercy does not decrease because we doubt it.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Is it ever Ok to leave Mass before it ends?

Answer:

This is an interesting question because beneath the surface there seems to be an assumption that if it's okay, then why do we have to stay after we receive communion? The short answer is "no," but we definitely want to go a bit deeper as we consider why.

First, when we think about questions like this, we must consider this in adult terms. If there is something gravely important that we need to do, then we must attend to that. However, if it is a matter of convenience or preference, then we really have to stop and think again. First, while we always want to recognize the importance of sacramental communion in the Mass, we also need to understand how important the time of thanksgiving and prayer after communion is. This is summarized in the Prayer After Communion offered by the celebrant and then we are also commissioned to "Go forth" during the Dismissal of the Mass, reminding us that we have been entrusted with a gift — the Word of God and the Presence of Christ in the sacrament — and that we are to share that gift with others.

If we simply leave after we receive communion, we risk two things. First, there is the possibility that we will turn our reception of communion into a purely personal, individual experience that is separated from our common experience of worship — and communion in the fullest sense — and, second, we lose an opportunity for gratitude and serious reflection if we simply leave after communion. This time of thanksgiving, reflection, and, ultimately, missioning, are important and, in the end, an essential part of the celebration of the Mass.

REQUIREMENTS PRIOR TO THE BAPTISM OF YOUR CHILD

In order to baptize your child in our parish, parent (s) please come to the Parish Office to obtain an outline, describing the necessary requirements — PRIOR to both the parents and godparents being scheduled to attend a required pre-baptism class:



Parents

1. Must be registered parishioner in our parish
2. Parent (s) must be baptized and submit a copy of their Confirmation certificate.
3. If the parents are married, provide a copy of their Catholic marriage
4. Parent(s) must provide a copy of their child's birth certificate.

Godparent (s) At Least One:

1. Must be a practicing Catholic, following the teachings of the Catholic faith.
2. The godparent must be baptized and submit a copy of their Confirmation (certificate is required).
3. The godparent, if married must provide a copy of their Catholic marriage certificate.

Only after receiving the required documentation, must the parent(s) and godparents (s) have attended the pre-baptism class, can the baptism of your child be scheduled.

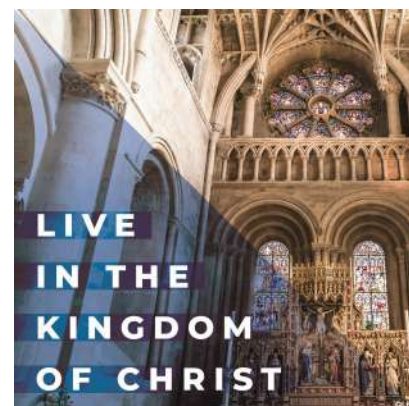

He received all his Sacraments of Initiation here. He was an altar server since 2015. He was a member of the CERS group since 2021 and more recently, was helping his sister, Mariela, with the Wednesday evening Youth Bible study group. He graduated from Lee Williams HS in May 2023 and has decided to dedicate some time to strengthen and learn more about his faith. He left on August 4, 2023, to join Christ of the Desert House of Formation, in Palmdale, CA. He will be on his formation journey for nine months, with other young adults, all of whom have chosen to live by the virtues of obedience, poverty, and chastity.

After the formation period, he will discern if he would like to make his promise to become a Missionary Servant of the Word for one year, serving in whatever mission he is sent to here in the United
