

## Reflection for Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Year B Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time – July 7, 2024 Deacon Steven D. Greydanus

Readings: Ez 2:2–5 • Ps 123: 1–2, 2, 3–4 • 2 Cor 12:7 -10 • Mk 6:1–6 bible.usccb.org/bible/readings/070724.cfm

The Catechism of the Catholic Church, in the section on the First Commandment, lists atheism as "a sin against the virtue of religion" — not just a false belief or an error, but a sin. Now, the Catechism is quick to acknowledge that culpability in particular atheists "can be significantly diminished in virtue of the intentions and the circumstances." In praying for "those who do not acknowledge God" in the Solemn Intercessions on Good Friday, the Church asks that, in "following what is right in sincerity of heart, they may find the way to God himself." So disbelieving in God's existence doesn't automatically mean that someone isn't sincere in seeking to follow what is right and true. Saint Edith Stein — an atheist herself in her youth — wrote in a 1938 letter, "God is truth. All who seek truth seek God, whether this is clear to them or not." Atheists may not be aware of seeking God, but we can hope that by seeking truth, goodness, and beauty, they do seek for him. Even so, none of this allows us to entirely separate questions of belief from moral virtue or vice. There is such a thing as being responsible for what you *ought* to know, and not every belief or opinion is arrived at entirely honestly.

"Whether they heed or resist — for they are a rebellious house — they shall know that a prophet has been among them," God tells Ezekiel in the first reading. Will they know it? God calls the Israelites "rebels who have rebelled against me . . . hard of face and obstinate of heart." Will these obstinate people recognize Ezekiel as a true prophet? Father von Balthasar, commenting on this passage, suggests that perhaps God means that they will come to realize it in the future. Even if they don't acknowledge it, though, does that mean they don't know, on some level? What did Jesus' neighbors in Nazareth make of him in the Gospel reading? They did acknowledge his wisdom and his mighty deeds. They spoke well of him, according to Luke's Gospel. Yet they also took offense. To them Jesus was simply "the carpenter," the son of a carpenter, a regular guy whose mother and family members they knew. Prophets for them were mysterious figures in the scriptures, or at least had the decency to live in the wilderness and dress and act in unusual ways. Jesus for them was too familiar, too normal, to be something special. Does this mean they weren't responsible for their rejection of Jesus?

Among the most attractive and reassuring of the Church's teachings is that the possibility of salvation is not limited only to those who are fully incorporated into the Catholic Church, or even to those who explicitly desire to become Catholic. That is, non-Christians who, aided by grace, desire to know and to do the will of God and seek to do so as best they can, strive to repent of their failings and amend their lives, and hope for divine help can receive the gift of new life normally given in Baptism. This is called *implicit baptism of desire*.

But with this attractive and reassuring teaching comes a sobering corollary: If it's possible to be united to God via implicit desires or choices, it's also possible to reject or resist God via implicit desires or choices. Rejection or resistance of God can be explicit and deliberate: I've known rare cases of believers whose way of living is so openly contrary to what they profess to believe that they say in so many words, "I am not on the path to heaven; I expect to be damned." Usually, though, we rationalize our worst impulses. For instance, we know we're called to love our enemies and forgive all who sin against us, but it's easier to define down "love" and "forgiveness" — to reduce them to empty words that don't get in the way of our hatred and grudges.

We are now about halfway through 2024: the "Year of Prayer," as Pope Francis has designated it. Prayer is an encounter with God: the real you and the real God. One obstacle to true prayer is our tendency to prefer our ideas about God to God himself, and for that matter our ideas about ourselves to the truth about ourselves. You may have heard people say, "It's hard to hear God's voice when you've already decided what you want him to say."

What is it that I don't hear God saying because I don't want to hear it? What areas of my life, my worldview, my beliefs, do I not want to hear him calling me to change with his help? Lord Jesus, help us to pray fearlessly to hear your voice in all things, and open our ears and our minds so that whatever we've resisted hearing until now will be clear to us before this year ends. Amen.

Registration for the 2024-2025 Religious Education year is now open for both children's catechism classes and Order of Christian Initiation for Adults/Teens sessions.

Online registration will be done through Flocknote, and a link to the form is available on our website (stmarykingman.com), under the Formation tab.

Paper registration forms are available at the Parish Office.

Paper forms and QR codes for online registration will also be available after all Masses on the weekend of June 29.

Paper forms, along with the necessary documents, should be completed and returned to the Parish Office **no later than August 1**.

All the necessary documents for online registrations must also be received **no later than August 1**.

Registration for sacramental preparation will close on November 1st. Children joining the St.

Mary's Religious Education program after that date will begin their sacramental preparation the following year.

## Documents that will be required at the time of registration

Please review the list below carefully. All documents must be the originals, which will be immediately scanned/copied and returned.

- Child's birth certificate
- Child's Baptism certificate, if baptized
- Certificates for any other sacraments that the child has received in the Catholic Church.
- If your child has started their sacrament preparation at another parish, we will need a letter from that pastor to verify.

Baptized children who have not attended any formal catechism classes in the last two years will be placed in the Order of Christian Initiation Adapted for Children (OCIC) class.

### **Sponsor Requirements**

Participants who will be receiving their Baptism or Confirmation during this year will need a sponsor who meets the following requirements:

- The sponsor must be at least 16 years old, having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation, and if applicable, married in the Catholic Church.
- In order to function as a role model and support the candidate, the sponsor must be a practicing Catholic, who fully participates in the sacramental life of the Church in living a full and active Catholic life.
- The sponsor must be someone other than the mother or father of the candidate. Only one sponsor (godparent) is required, either male or female.
- This information must be verified by the sponsor's local pastor through a letter or email to the Religious Education Coordinator at St. Mary's.

All sponsor information and documents must be received by October 30.

# A Prophet and His Native Place

"A prophet is not without honor except in his native place." It could be the slogan of high school reunions everywhere.

I speak from experience — I didn't go to my high school reunion, but I do live in the same area in which I grew up. Ghosts from the past lurk in every grocery aisle and gas station. Former classmates fill my prescriptions at the pharmacy. I am always sure to see an old teacher or two at the Fourth of July parade.

If my teenage self knew that this was her future, she would be horrified. She wanted to grow up and move away, not because she didn't like living in this town, but because she wanted to reinvent herself. And you can't reinvent yourself in your native place. In your hometown, you'll always be exactly what you are — no more, no less.

The same was true for Jesus, who was probably the only person actually worthy of admiration at his high school reunion. When he returned to his native place, he was what he had always been — God and man, Messiah, miracle-worker. This is not something he became, it was always within him.

But the people of Nazareth cannot accept it. Why?

Well, probably for the same reason that I wanted to reinvent myself when I was 16. We don't often see anything worth venerating in the "right now" of our lives. We think happiness is a promotion or a pay bump away. We think we'll finally be holy when we find the time to take that silent retreat. We think we will be beautiful when we lose ten pounds.

The Nazarenes lived with God right under their noses, and they didn't realize it. So, when he came in all his greatness, the dissonance was too much to bear, and they rejected him. They didn't want that God — the one they had dismissed or overlooked or ignored. They wanted a different one. A shinier one. One that didn't look like the "right now" of their lives.

But that's where God is, folks. He's in the right now, and nowhere else. He's waiting there for you, with all the happiness, holiness, and beauty your life needs.

Jesus said to them, "A prophet is not without honor except in his native place and among his own kin and in his own house."

# Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

### Question:

In Year B, we hear primarily from the Gospel of Mark. Since each Evangelist has a unique perspective, what are the key issues that Mark addresses in his Gospel?

### Answer:

Gospels are a particular faith community's reflection on Jesus. Each Gospel's author reflected that community's faith in Jesus. Jesus' message is made relevant to the community's situation and context. Mark was the first Gospel to be written. When Matthew and Luke wrote theirs, they imitated and adapted Mark for their communities.

Mark's Gospel seems to be addressed to a faith community undergoing turmoil, rejection, and persecution—forces that threaten to overwhelm them. This provides the context around which Mark fashions the story of Jesus. He presents Jesus as the One sent by God to confront the forces of evil. That is the good news of Jesus.

Jesus' struggle with the demonic forces leads to confrontation, rejection, outright opposition, and a conspiracy to do away with him. Realizing this, Jesus is not deterred. Rather Jesus calls for total faith in God who helps us to overcome the forces of evil. Suffering and even death seem to be the consequences of this struggle. Yet, that is not the end. The one who suffers for the sake of others, the suffering servant, will be the one through whom redemption and salvation will come to all. For Mark, this is what discipleship demands and what true faith in God can and will accomplish. See if you can detect these themes as you read Mark's Gospel.

# REQUIREMENTS PRIOR TO THE BAPTISM OF YOUR CHILD

In order to baptize your child in our parish, parent (s) please come to the Parish Office to obtain an outline, describing the necessary requirements — PRIOR to both the parents and godparents being scheduled to att a required pre-baptism class:

### **Parents**

- 1. Must be registered parishioner in our parish
- 2. Parent (s) must be baptized and submit a copy of their Confirmation certificate.
  - 3. If the parents are married, provide a copy of their Catholic marriage
    - 4. Parent(s) must provide a copy of their child's birth certificate.

### **Godparent (s) At Least One:**

- 1. Must be a practicing Catholic, following the teachings of the Catholic faith.
- 2. The godparent must be baptized and submit a copy of their Confirmation (certificate is required).
  - 3. The godparent, if married must provide a copy of their Catholic marriage certificate.

Only after receiving the required documentation, must the parent(s) and godparents (s) have attended the pre-baptism class, can the baptism of your child be scheduled.


