

Reflection for Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Year B Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time – July 14, 2024 Deacon Steven D. Greydanus

"A plan for the fullness of times, to sum up all things in Christ, in heaven and on earth." This amazing sentence in the second reading, from St. Paul's letter to the Ephesians, is the climax to a magnificent passage that comes up in the Sunday Mass readings just once every three years — today being that day — though this passage is prayed by priests, deacons, and religious typically every week in the Divine Office, during Monday Evening Prayer! So it's a key passage in the heart and mind of the Church, even though we hear it so seldom at Sunday Mass.

Here's how that climactic sentence reads in the Divine Office translation: "a plan to be carried out in Christ, in the fullness of time, to bring all things into one in him, in the heavens and on earth." If you were wondering what it means to "sum up all things in Christ," this wording may be helpful: "to bring all things into one in him." Other translations have "to unite all things in him" (RSV, ESV, cf. NIV), or "to gather together" (KJV, NKJV) or "gather up all things in him" (NRSV). And Paul is clear that "all things" means "the things in the heavens and the things on the earth" (ASV, ERV) — in other words, all of creation, the whole cosmos!

I'm not sure we think enough about this: what the plan of God in Christ means, not just for us, but for all of creation. We think a lot about what it means for human beings — reasonably enough, since Jesus came as one of us. He didn't become a snow leopard, or a fir tree, or a galaxy — not because he couldn't have done so if he wanted to, but because that wasn't God's plan! He became human, taking to himself human nature created in God's own image, in order to reveal God to human beings and to redeem our fallen nature.

Yet in the act of becoming human, the Son of God took to himself not just a human soul, but also a human body: a body made of the same building blocks as all life on earth — cells, DNA, proteins, amino acids, and so forth — all formed of the same material stuff as the rest of the visible universe. You may have heard the idea that human beings are made of stardust: that the elements composing our bodies were forged in dying stars. If that's true, it would follow that, in Jesus, stardust was united to God, died on the cross, and rose to immortal life . . . and that has implications

for every dying star from the beginning of time to the heat death of the universe.

"In him we have redemption by his blood," St. Paul writes. Why his blood? Why was Jesus' flesh pierced and his blood shed on the cross? Why did he suffer not just in his spirit but in his body as well? To redeem our souls from sin, yes, but also to redeem our bodies from death. As we share in his death through Baptism, so we hope to share in his resurrection — and glorified bodies require glorified space! "I go to prepare a place for you," Jesus told his disciples. Not just a place for our souls, a place for our bodies also — a real place. God didn't create snow leopards and fir trees and galaxies for all of it to just go away! He means to bring all things into one in Christ, to unite in him all things in the heavens and on the earth.

Meanwhile this present world, like our mortal bodies, is passing away. The earth will die, as will the Sun and all the stars. Does that make this world less important? On the contrary, the Second Vatican Council teaches in *Gaudium et Spes*, the Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World:

The expectation of a new earth must not weaken but rather stimulate our concern for cultivating this one. For here grows the body of a new human family, a body which even now is able to give some kind of foreshadowing of the new age.

Hence, while earthly progress must be carefully distinguished from the growth of Christ's kingdom, to the extent that the former can contribute to the better ordering of human society, it is of vital concern to the Kingdom of God.

In some way God begins to anticipate summing up things in Christ through how we live in this world, from how we treat one another, to how we vote, to how we care for snow leopards and fir trees and the rest of creation. We can't bring about the kingdom of God on earth, but if we seek God's glory in this world in everything that we do, then the kingdom is already at work in us.

Registration for the 2024-2025 Religious Education year is now open for both children's catechism classes and Order of Christian Initiation for Adults/Teens sessions.

Online registration will be done through Flocknote, and a link to the form is available on our website (stmarykingman.com), under the Formation tab.

Paper registration forms are available at the Parish Office.

Paper forms and QR codes for online registration will also be available after all Masses on the weekend of June 29.

Paper forms, along with the necessary documents, should be completed and returned to the Parish Office **no later than August 1**.

All the necessary documents for online registrations must also be received **no later than August 1**.

Registration for sacramental preparation will close on November 1st. Children joining the St.

Mary's Religious Education program after that date will begin their sacramental preparation the following year.

Documents that will be required at the time of registration

Please review the list below carefully. *All documents must be the originals, which will be immediately scanned/copied and returned.*

- Child's birth certificate
- Child's Baptism certificate, if baptized
- Certificates for any other sacraments that the child has received in the Catholic Church.
- If your child has started their sacrament preparation at another parish, we will need a letter from that pastor to verify.

Baptized children who have not attended any formal catechism classes in the last two years will be placed in the Order of Christian Initiation Adapted for Children (OCIC) class.

Sponsor Requirements

Participants who will be receiving their Baptism or Confirmation during this year will need a sponsor who meets the following requirements:

- The sponsor must be at least 16 years old, having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation, and if applicable, married in the Catholic Church.
- In order to function as a role model and support the candidate, the sponsor must be a practicing Catholic, who fully participates in the sacramental life of the Church in living a full and active Catholic life.
- The sponsor must be someone other than the mother or father of the candidate. Only one sponsor (godparent) is required, either male or female.
- This information must be verified by the sponsor's local pastor through a letter or email to the Religious Education Coordinator at St. Mary's.

All sponsor information and documents must be received by October 30.

Shake Off the Dust

Our kitchen floor is at least 35 years old, and it's the ugliest color to come out of the '80s. But it's a good, durable floor, and my husband, bless his heart, guards it like it was a finely finished hardwood imported from Brazil.

Every time the kids track mud and sand across its vinyl surface, he immediately gets down on his hands and knees and lovingly wipes the mess away. I'm too impatient to do this myself — we have kids, so we're going to have a dirty floor, is my attitude. But this is the hill upon which my husband dies. On hands and knees, scraping dirt off an almost 40-year-old floor, he is the silent, long-suffering sentry, and if it kills him, he will keep these floors pristine. He is Gandalf, and the dirt is the Balrog. You shall not pass.

"Shake the dust off your feet." This is what Christ tells his disciples to do when they — and his word — are rejected. Shake the dust off your feet in testimony against them. Why does he say that? It's not an act of dismissal. It's not a thumbed nose or a stuck-out tongue. No, it's an act of caution: *Don't bring it with you. Leave it there.*

When we walk through the world, we pick up a lot of dirt. Misguided notions, disordered priorities, habits, and desires that we never noticed until we realized they left a trail. We come into a situation intending to do what is right, but somehow it all goes sideways, and we walk away from it with detritus clinging to us in places we don't notice. They wouldn't listen. They'll see, we think. Oh, they'll see. They'll see how right I was. Pride and vengeance hitch a ride on the soles of our feet, and we track them all through the world.

What to do about this? You can be like me with my ugly old floor. You can shrug your shoulders and say, "It happens, I guess. I'm only human. I meant well."

But here's what would be better: be like my husband. Get down on your knees and get rid of the dirt. Stop the trail in its tracks.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Our Catholic grade school is doing a penance service this Lent. Do young children really need to go to Confession? How much sin can they really have?

Answer:

Ask any mom about her children and see how many would say she has a brood of perfect angels! Parents know that kids do things that are wrong ... and they often know they're doing it! Even toddlers have a sense of right and wrong. The Church recognizes that their minds and consciences are not yet fully developed, however, and typically waits until age seven to offer the sacrament of Confession. Around that age and beyond, most young people, when asked, can easily explain why something is wrong.

Confession for children is an excellent way to help them reflect on their actions and accept responsibility for their behavior. It helps them to grow in their understanding of sin and how it affects others. This helps them to form their consciences and make better choices in the future. Most importantly, they learn the value of forgiveness, both given and received. Rather than singling out what's wrong, Confession offers hope and a new start! Children can grow in understanding God's unconditional love and develop a sense of inner dignity that transcends their failings. Not bad for five minutes and an "Our Father" or two!

REQUIREMENTS PRIOR TO THE BAPTISM OF YOUR CHILD

In order to baptize your child in our parish, parent (s) please come to the Parish Office to obtain an outline, describing the necessary requirements — PRIOR to both the parents and godparents being scheduled to att a required pre-baptism class:

Parents

- 1. Must be registered parishioner in our parish
- 2. Parent (s) must be baptized and submit a copy of their Confirmation certificate.
 - 3. If the parents are married, provide a copy of their Catholic marriage
 - 4. Parent(s) must provide a copy of their child's birth certificate.

Godparent (s) At Least One:

- 1. Must be a practicing Catholic, following the teachings of the Catholic faith.
- 2. The godparent must be baptized and submit a copy of their Confirmation (certificate is required).
 - 3. The godparent, if married must provide a copy of their Catholic marriage certificate.

Only after receiving the required documentation, must the parent(s) and godparents (s) have attended the pre-baptism class, can the baptism of your child be scheduled.


