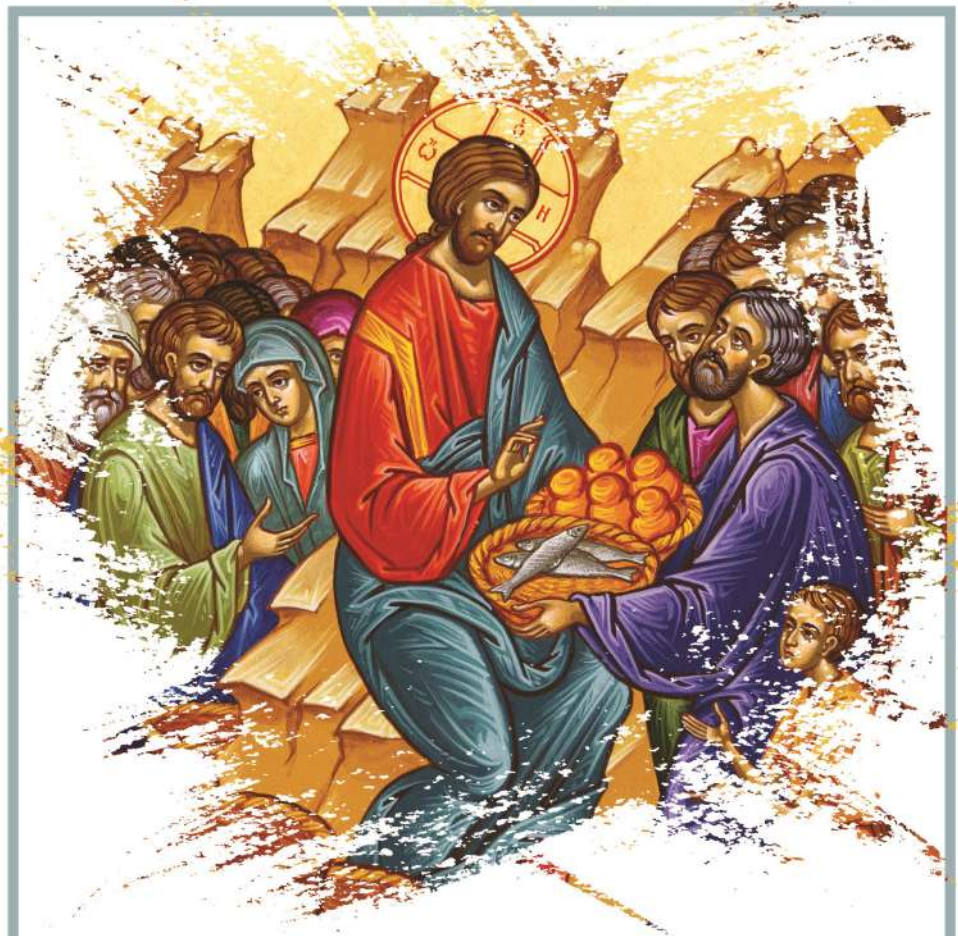

Reflection for Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Year B
Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time – July 28, 2024

“This is truly the Prophet, the one who is to come into the world.” For a moment the crowd in today’s reading from the Gospel of John seem to have experienced an epiphany of faith: an insight into Jesus’ identity like Andrew and Philip in John chapter 1 (John 1:41, 45) or the Samaritan woman at the well in chapter 4 (John 4:29). But then Jesus is obliged to withdraw from them — to not entrust himself to them, just like he has before with shallow followers who believed in him only because “they saw the signs which he did” (John 2:23). Jesus “knew what was in” people like that; he knew their faith was in signs, not in Jesus himself.

To be clear, Jesus will work with that! Belief in signs is a place to start! “Believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me,” Jesus tells his disciples, “or at least believe me for the sake of the works themselves” (John 14:11). And yet the crowd in today’s Gospel isn’t even quite at that level. Next Sunday, in the continuation of this Gospel reading, Jesus will tell this crowd, “You are looking for me, not because you saw signs, but because you ate the loaves and were filled” (John 6:26). Not belief in Jesus himself, not even belief in signs, but sheer appetite drives them to seek Jesus. They just want more food! When Jesus urges them to believe in him, they ask for another sign — and they say in so many words that they’d like him to do the bread thing again! (John 6:29–31)

And Jesus will work with this too! Let’s not be too hard on these people. This is the same crowd we heard about last Sunday: Jesus “had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd” (Mark 6:34). Jesus spent hours healing them, but also teaching them — shepherding them. When they got hungry, he saw to their needs, as a shepherd does. At that point, though, it turns out that this flock wants to be shepherded on their own terms. They want to “carry him off to make him king” — and clearly

they’ve got their own ideas about what kind of king Jesus should be. Much later, of course, Jesus will tell Pontius Pilate, “My kingdom is not of this world” (John 18:36), but this crowd isn’t ready to hear that.

Well, are Catholics today necessarily so different? Are we never preoccupied by signs — caught up, for example, in reports of Marian apparitions and visionary messages, even treating oracles from visionaries as effectively equal to Church teaching, or even to the Word of God? Are we immune to turning to God chiefly with our wants and needs? What about having our own ideas about what Christ’s kingship should mean in our lives and our world? Particularly in an election year, might it be that we come to Jesus with our own ideas about what the kingdom of God means in our world today?

To be clear, turning to God with our needs, and even our wants, is a good thing, not a bad thing. God knows what we need before we ask, Jesus tells us, but he also teaches us to pray for our daily bread; to persevere in prayer and not lose heart (Luke 18:1ff). Every good gift comes from God; “the hand of the Lord feeds us; he answers all our needs,” as we sang in the responsorial psalm. Need can and should prod us to prayer to ask God for his gifts — but the one gift of God we need above all is prayer itself! Our greatest need is not the gifts, but the Giver!

Turning to God only for what he can give us, trying to use prayer only to meet our needs, is like trying to “use the stairs of heaven as a short cut to the nearest [pharmacy],” as C.S. Lewis wrote in *The Screwtape Letters*. “Seek first God’s kingdom and his righteousness,” Jesus tells us, and all the other things will be given to us as well (Matthew 6:33). But the kingdom must be first! God must be first. Anything that is not God himself — even holy things like miracles and visions, or good things like responsible political commitments, or things we need — can become an idol. Only the Lord himself truly answers our deepest needs.

Religious Education Updates:

Registration for the 2024-2025 Religious Education year is now open for both children's catechism classes and Order of Christian Initiation for Adults/Teens sessions.

Online registration will be done through Flocknote, and a link to the form is available on our website (stmarykingman.com), under the Formation tab.

Paper registration forms are available at the Parish Office.

Paper forms and QR codes for online registration will also be available after all Masses on the weekend of June 29.

Paper forms, along with the necessary documents, should be completed and returned to the Parish Office **no later than August 1**.

All the necessary documents for online registrations must also be received **no later than August 1**.

Registration for sacramental preparation will close on November 1st. Children joining the St. Mary's Religious Education program after that date will begin their sacramental preparation the following year.

Documents that will be required at the time of registration

Please review the list below carefully. *All documents must be the originals, which will be immediately scanned/copied and returned.*

- Child's birth certificate
- Child's Baptism certificate, if baptized
- Certificates for any other sacraments that the child has received in the Catholic Church.
- If your child has started their sacrament preparation at another parish, we will need a letter from that pastor to verify.

Baptized children **who have not attended any formal catechism classes in the last two years** will be placed in the Order of Christian Initiation Adapted for Children (OCIC) class.

Sponsor Requirements

Participants who will be receiving their Baptism or Confirmation during this year will need a sponsor who meets the following requirements:

- The sponsor must be at least 16 years old, having received Baptism, Eucharist, **and Confirmation, and if applicable, married in the Catholic Church.**
- In order to function as a role model and support the candidate, the sponsor must be a practicing Catholic, who fully participates in the sacramental life of the Church in living a full and active Catholic life.
- The sponsor must be someone other than the mother or father of the candidate. Only one sponsor (godparent) is required, either male or female.
- This information must be verified by the sponsor's local pastor through a letter or email to the Religious Education Coordinator at St. Mary's.

All sponsor information and documents must be received by October 30.

Take More

It doesn't matter what time of day we visit my mother-in-law — she always has food to offer. If we take two helpings, she will encourage us to take three. If we take three helpings, she will say, "*Coraggio* — take more." (She's Italian, in case you couldn't tell from the food-pushing and the language.)

When Jesus feeds the five thousand with the miracle of the loaves and fish, he does not produce *just* enough food to feed everyone who is there. He certainly could — that would be within his power. And he shows concern about waste, so it would make sense for him to do that. But instead, he deliberately overproduces. He creates more food than is necessary. He makes an abundance of it. Why?

I think it's for the same reason my mother-in-law keeps urging us to eat when we come to her house. Feeding people is not just a functional action. It's a gesture. It shows love. It shows concern. It shows welcome. Having an abundance of food — so much that there is some left over — is a sign that you don't care how much someone wants — you are ready to give whatever they are ready to take. You are ready to give recklessly. You are ready to give them not just all they need but also all they could want.

I think of this when I approach the sacrament of Confession. Time and time again I walk up to the door of that little room, a list of oft-repeated sins in my hand and a sense of shame on my heart.

Here I am again, Jesus. Back for more mercy. Hope you haven't run out.

He hasn't yet. He never will. "*Coraggio*," he whispers deep in my heart, "take more."

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

My coworkers and I have been debating the death penalty and whether or not it should be part of our justice system. Why are so many people who claim to be pro-life believers in favor of it?

Answer:

The issues of crime and punishment are never easy because so many factors influence people and how they view problems and solutions. Increased violence, loss of life, cost to taxpayers and the community at large, and the maneuverings of lawyers and courts only add fuel to the fire. When bad things happen in your neighborhood or to your home or to you, you want relief. Any normal person would feel that way. A pro-life view does not insulate anyone from the bad effects of criminal behavior. Innocent people are hurt every day and it may seem as though those who cause the pain get away with it, or get off easy.

The death penalty is not excluded by Church teaching. The state has the right to impose penalties that are commensurate with the crime as well as to defend itself from further harm (Catechism of the Catholic Church, §2266). When possible, punishment should help correct the offender, offering a chance of redemption, which is why the pope and bishops have called for an end to the death penalty. REQUIREMENTS PRIOR TO THE BAPTISM OF YOUR CHILD

In order to baptize your child in our parish, parent (s) please come to the Parish Office to obtain an outline, describing the necessary requirements — PRIOR to both the parents and godparents being scheduled to attend a required pre-baptism class:



Parents

1. Must be registered parishioner in our parish
2. Parent (s) must be baptized and submit a copy of their Confirmation certificate.
3. If the parents are married, provide a copy of their Catholic marriage
4. Parent(s) must provide a copy of their child's birth certificate.

Godparent (s) At Least One:

1. Must be a practicing Catholic, following the teachings of the Catholic faith.
2. The godparent must be baptized and submit a copy of their Confirmation (certificate is required).
3. The godparent, if married must provide a copy of their Catholic marriage certificate.

Only after receiving the required documentation, must the parent(s) and godparents (s) have attended the pre-baptism class, can the baptism of your child be scheduled.
