

Reflection for Twenty Third Sunday in Ordinary Time: Year B Twenty Third Sunday in Ordinary Time – September 8, 2024 Fr. Michael Bruno

In the Rite of Baptism, the priest or deacon prays over the newly baptized child in the very manner in which our Lord heals in today's Gospel. Touching the ears and mouth of the child, he prays the following words: "The Lord Jesus made the deaf hear and the mute speak. May he soon touch your ears to receive his word and your mouth to proclaim his faith, to the praise and glory of God the Father."

The invocation after Baptism of this miraculous encounter in Mark's Gospel is a reminder how the Lord Jesus has individually called and claimed each one of us, just as he called the man in today's Gospel to come aside and move away from the crowds. In Baptism, He has opened our ears to the Gospel of salvation, which we hear proclaimed within His Church, allowing us to grow in knowledge and love of Him. He has opened our mouths and called us to herald His saving presence in the world by "speaking plainly," drawing others to Him through our words and in the manner of our lives. As St. James explains in today's epistle, God has chosen "those who are poor in the world to be rich in faith and heirs of the kingdom . . ." The Church, therefore, finds in the miraculous healing of today's Gospel an image of how each one of us has been healed by Christ and sent forth as His disciples and witnesses in the world. We have been rendered sons and daughters of the Father made whole in Christ. Already foreshadowed in today's Gospel is the moment when the Lord Jesus will again look to heaven and groan, but this time it will be from the cross, as He offers Himself completely and totally to the Father for the healing and salvation of all the world.

The reaction of the crowds to this miracle is "astonishment." noted as The Lord's miraculous works are signs of God's salvation fulfilling the prophetic promises made to the people of Israel in exile. As we hear in Isaiah's prophecy, the coming of the Lord will be marked with the vindication and recompense of God, which will be manifested in the restoration of sight, hearing, movement, and speech. The coming of the Lord will, therefore, be a moment of renewal and restoration, a "re-creation" brought about in the promised Savior. No surprise, therefore, that our Lord is met with astonishment, as His miracles and wondrous works fulfill the prophet's words and manifest God's salvation both for the man who is healed and, indeed, for all humanity.

Today's Gospel, therefore, bids us to consider our own lives as disciples and witnesses of Christ. Asking today for the Lord's healing once again, we seek His mercy for the ways we have been blind to His presence and His workings in our life. We ask forgiveness for the moments when we failed to hear and heed His word in our own words and deeds. Approaching the Lord Jesus this Sunday in the Eucharist, we marvel in astonishment, as He calls us uniquely and personally to healing and wholeness in Him. As we receive Him, He again opens our eyes and ears, sending us forth into the world to proclaim the good news of salvation. For with awe and thanksgiving for His marvelous works, we too proclaim with all our hearts how truly "He has done all things well!"

Be Opened

There are several moments throughout the calendar year when we are tricked into thinking we can reinvent ourselves.

One of them is New Year's Day. The barista at my coffee shop told me that they sell more decaf coffee in January than in the entirety of the remaining year, because everyone is swearing off caffeine. By February, she said, the trend subsides: folks have realized they're not actually superheroes just because the last digit of the year has increased by one.

The beginning of a new school year is another of those moments. Every pencil is freshly sharpened, and every lesson plan is painstakingly plotted. Our heads are full of what we plan to do this year, how we plan to do it, who we plan to become.

But by May, the wind is out of our sails. We've learned the concepts, we've used up the pencils, yes — but we've remembered that underneath it all we're basically the same people, with the same shortcomings and the same obstacles as we always were. The only difference in September was we had new planners.

The truth is that we cannot reinvent ourselves. We can't change ourselves at all, not on New Year's Day or the first day of school or on our 40th birthday or after quitting a bad habit. We are what we are: blind in some ways, deaf in others, crippled in still more, moving through life with uncertainty, stumbling in the dark.

People don't change. Not without miracles.

But being a Christian means believing in miracles and being ready for them at any moment — in January or in September, in the middle of a hopeless week or at the end of a bad day, when you feel strong and when you don't, when you want to be better and when you feel too tired to try.

No, we can't change ourselves, but we can be changed. There is one who can change us if we will let him. He is waiting — now, tomorrow, yesterday, next week. The time is always right for a miracle.

"He put his finger into the man's ears ... and said to him, 'Ephphatha!' that is, 'Be opened!' —And immediately the man's ears were opened ..." Mark 7:34-35

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

What is the history behind feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross?

Answer:

Emperor Constantine's mother, Helena, is credited with having discovered the true cross around 330. She traveled to the Holy Land and uncovered the places associated with Jesus' life. Legend has it that Helena uncovered three crosses but was not able to detect the true cross until each of them was laid on a leper. Only one of them cured the leper, proving it to be the true cross. A great church was built at the site, and soon various portions of the cross were sent to other churches as relics to be venerated.

The day after the dedication of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, September 14, 335, the actual cross was displayed for veneration. Egeria, a women traveler to Jerusalem around the year 386, kept a diary that has survived. She tells of the unique veneration of the wood of the cross that took place on Good Friday, something maintained ritually to this very day.

The Exaltation of the Holy Cross focuses on the gift of love that Jesus manifested by his total gift of self, offered for all. The cross, the ultimate form of capital punishment in its day, has become for us the ultimate symbol of love and triumph over evil and death.

HAND CARVED in BETHLEHEM

PLEASE STOP BY THE TABLES OF RELIGIOUS WARES (Nativity set, rosaries, statues, crucifixes, charms, etc.) AFTER ALL THE MASSES THE WEEKEND OF (September 21 & 22).

Ayman Khair is representing about 180 Christian families from Bethlehem. These families have been dependent upon sales of their hand carved religious articles to tourists of the Holy Land. Due to the conflict in the Middle East and the War tourism has been stopped completely.

It is very important to support them at this critical time since they have no income and there is no tourism at all. In order to survive, they have turned to Christian communities in the United States to purchase their articles.

These hand carved religious articles are beyond description. Carved from wood of the sacred Olive tree, this workmanship has been traditional for these families for hundreds of years. It is hoped that through the efforts of Mr. Khair, these families who have little income will be able to stay living and survive in the Holy Land.

Sadly enough, the Christian population dropped from 22 % to less than 2% in the last 20 years. *Thank you in advance for your support.*
