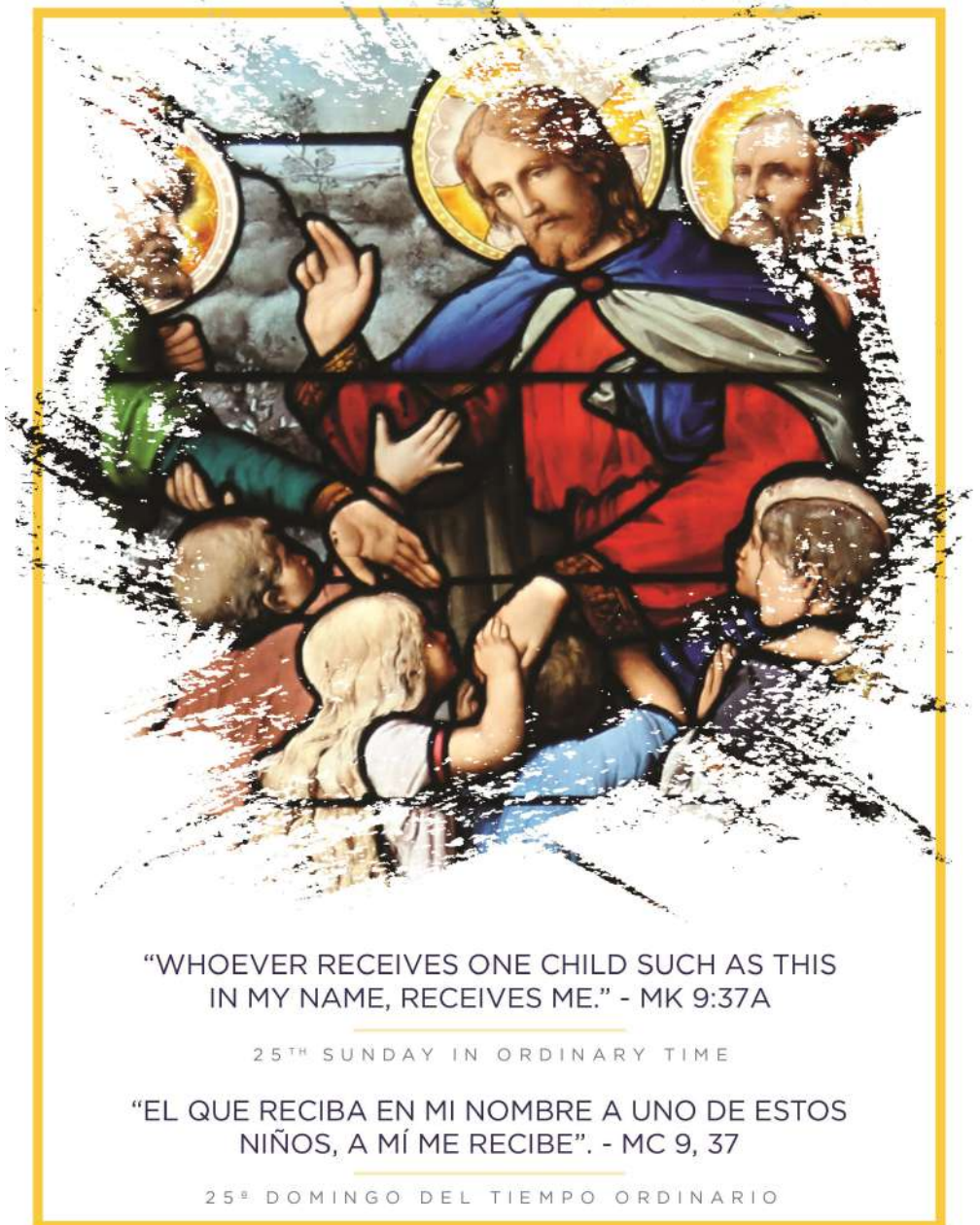

What does success look like for a Christian? Our culture has its own standards determining what constitutes success and failure. Fame, wealth, and power are, of course, indicators that one has “made it” in this world. Consequently, many people seek, by various means, to acquire as much fame, wealth, and power as possible. But as Christians, our standards differ from those of the world. As a result, success looks very different for a Christian. In a letter to a friend, the English poet and Jesuit priest Gerard Manley Hopkins described Jesus as a man “doomed to succeed by failure.” In today’s Gospel, Jesus teaches his disciples how he is to succeed by failure.

At the beginning of this chapter in the Gospel, Mark relates the story of the Transfiguration, in which Jesus reveals his divine glory to Peter, James, and John. After this, the disciples witness Jesus expel an unclean spirit. On account of his many miracles, Jesus’ renown increases and people from all over seek him out. In the view of the disciples, Jesus is successful; has everything going for him. And the disciples desire to share in this success as they discuss who among them is the greatest. It is no wonder, then, that when Jesus reminds his disciples that he “is to be handed over to men, and they will kill him,” they respond with bewilderment. Why would Jesus risk his success, and theirs as well, by handing himself over to death? In this case, the disciples are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do.

The “wicked” in today’s first reading likewise hold to a worldly notion of success. In their materialistic worldview, there is nothing beyond what is seen and experienced in this life, and so death, which marks the end of existence, is the ultimate failure. Consequently, one must enjoy life, even at another’s expense. The way of life of the just man, who trusts in God, is an affront to their hedonistic lifestyle, and so must be eliminated. In their eyes, the just man’s untimely death at their hands represents utter failure, because it appears that God has not come to his aid. They claim success in this regard by their ability to condemn the just man “to a shameful death.” However, later on in the book of Wisdom, the author affirms the contrary: “The souls of the just are in the hand of God, and no

torment shall touch them. They seemed, in the view of the foolish, to be dead . . . But they are in peace” (Wis 3:1–3). The worldly standards of the wicked do not take into account that God is at work through suffering and death because “their wickedness blinded them and they do not know the hidden counsel of God” (2:21–22). What the world considers failure, God uses a means for His victory.

Jesus’ second passion prediction teaches the disciples that true success takes the form of the cross. Jesus accomplishes God’s victory over sin and death not by acquiring fame, prestige, wealth, or worldly power, but by handing himself over to a “shameful death” on a cross, looking like a fool and a failure in the eyes of the world. Yet, as St. Paul reminds us, “the wisdom of this age is foolishness in the eyes of God” (1 Cor 3:19). For Christians, success is achieved by imitating Christ crucified who willingly and wholeheartedly gave his life in loving sacrifice for us. What the world might consider failure or foolishness or a “shameful death” — such as loving one’s enemies, giving alms, going out of one’s way to practice charity without expecting recompense, giving up an hour on Sunday to attend Mass, setting aside time for daily prayer, trying to live poverty, chastity, and obedience, or simply enduring daily trials and struggles with patience and trust — all of this is, in God’s eyes, a success, a victory, because it brings us to the foot of the cross, a place not only of suffering or death, but a place where true life and an abundance of grace are to be found.

Like Jesus, the Christian is someone who is “doomed to succeed by failure.” How, then, does God’s Word this week challenge me to reevaluate my own understanding of success and failure as a Christian? What are some situations in my life that bring me to the foot of the cross, and how might I see these, from the perspective of the Gospel, as opportunities to participate in Jesus’ passion, death, and resurrection? Strengthened by our participation in the sacraments, especially the most Holy Eucharist, let us ask for the grace to embrace Jesus’ “failure” in our own lives, so that we who share in His sufferings, may likewise share in His victory.

Bearing Witness

I am fascinated by minor Gospel characters. These people — the rich young man, the adulterous woman, the teachers at the temple — share the stage with Jesus only briefly. They bear passing but powerful witness to crucial moments of his earthly ministry. They breathe the air he breathes. They hear the sound of his voice. Some of them feel the touch of his skin.

And then they go on with their lives and disappear into obscurity. They become just another one of us.

I think of the child who sat in Jesus' lap while he said those famous words: *"Whoever receives one child such as this in my name, receives me; and whoever receives me, receives not me but the One who sent me."*

What did the boy think? Did he understand the words, or did he only know that they were gently spoken? Did he only think to himself how kind was the face of this man, and how consoling and warm his embrace?

I picture this child growing up. Perhaps he married and loved his wife and children. Perhaps he was happy, or perhaps he was not. Perhaps he became wealthy or was even wealthy to begin with. Perhaps he, like so many other children of that era, had only a very short life, and returned quickly to the arms that enveloped him that day in Capernaum.

We don't know. But we know he was there: he saw Christ, he felt him, he heard him. We sigh to think of it. *How lucky. If only we could, too. Then it would be easier. Then we could be holy.*

But we are all this child in Capernaum. We are all the woman at the well. We are all the centurion at the cross. Every time we kneel before the Host and hear the words "This is my Body," we occupy the same earthly time and space as the Messiah, and he fixes upon us the same gaze he fixed upon them.

We all bear witness.

We receive him, and then we go back to our lives, our ordinary lives.

Do we carry him with us? Do we dare?

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

There seems to be a lot of division in some Christian churches over moral issues, especially abortion, ordination, and end-of-life care. If all Christians follow the Gospel of Jesus, why is there such a difference of opinion?

Answer:

There is always a struggle between culture and religion, and part of that struggle is politics. To be politically correct means that you must embrace the secular virtue of the moment so that you are "enlightened," "sensitive," "aware," and, most importantly, "open-minded." Unfortunately, common sense can be sacrificed in the race to be "PC."

Some factions within Christian denominations have tried to redefine tradition, history, and biblical teaching to bend it around the politically correct religious thinking of the day. On the life issues that you mention, there are those who began with their own conclusions and have tried to bend theology around their conclusions. This is possible in part because of a lack of a central teaching authority and partly because society has become apathetic to these issues. It will result in a lot of division, factions, and schisms. The Gospel calls all believers to embrace the truth, to turn from sin, and to seek holiness and justice. No matter how hard some may try, a square peg will not fit a round hole. The camel cannot fit through the eye of the needle.

HAND CARVED in BETHLEHEM

PLEASE STOP BY THE TABLES OF RELIGIOUS WARES (Nativity set, rosaries, statues, crucifixes, charms, etc.) AFTER ALL THE MASSES THE WEEKEND OF (September 21 & 22).

Ayman Khair is representing about 180 Christian families from Bethlehem. These families have been dependent upon sales of their hand carved religious articles to tourists of the Holy Land. Due to the conflict in the Middle East and the War tourism has been stopped completely.

It is very important to support them at this critical time since they have no income and there is no tourism at all. In order to survive, they have turned to Christian communities in the United States to purchase their articles.

These **hand carved religious articles are beyond description.** Carved from **wood of the sacred Olive tree**, this workmanship has been traditional for these families for hundreds of years. It is hoped that through the efforts of Mr. Khair, these families who have little income will be able to stay living and survive in the Holy Land.

Sadly enough, the Christian population dropped from 22 % to less than 2% in the last 20 years. *Thank you in advance for your support.*

Even though they were friends, sometimes the disciples fought with each other. In today's Gospel reading, they were fighting over who was the most important.

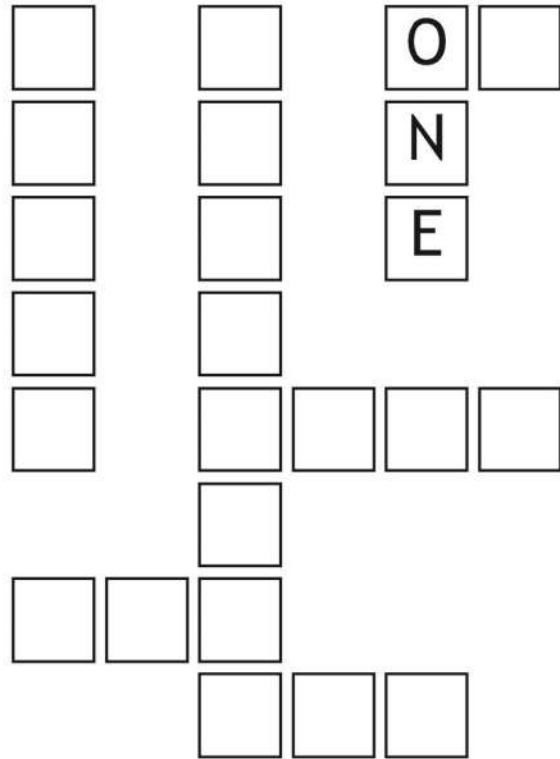
All twelve of them wanted to be number one-the best disciple. Then Jesus told them a secret. The best disciple is the one who helps other people.
