





Everyday Stewardship - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

Giving as God does

Ask yourself this question — what would you pray for if you really believed God could and would do anything for you? In my experience, we all have something. We all have that miracle we're afraid to request, afraid we will be disappointed.

Do we doubt God's readiness to give because we ourselves have such an imperfect understanding of charity and love? Maybe if we had better faith in God we would be more ready to give of ourselves — and maybe if we were more ready to give of ourselves, we would understand more clearly the ways of God.

Because we're not really afraid that God can't do something. We know He can do anything. What we're afraid of is that He will do what He always does: give us what we need, not what we want.

Have you ever had a friend in need and you just wanted to give them something — a meal, a phone call, a text? Not because you knew it would help, but simply because you wanted to reach out. And have they ever said to you: It wasn't so much what you gave, but the fact that you did. You gave them what they needed even if it wasn't what they specifically asked for.

When we give in this manner, we are giving as God does. Sometimes we are afraid to ask because we don't want to be disappointed. But remember, the blind man on the road got what he asked for, but he would have gotten what he needed even if his answer had been the opposite. God's generosity is always reckless, and it's always perfect.



The Safety of Darkness

Leprosy and blindness and deafness — oh, my. The disabilities cured by Jesus in his public ministry really are quite something, aren't they? Vividly symbolic and rich food for reflection. It just wouldn't be the same if Jesus had cured eczema or athlete's foot or compulsive nailbiting.

Blind Bartimaeus, sitting by the side of the road, in particular captures my imagination. Because I have a confession to make, sometimes, I like to sit in the darkness, even though I know it isn't very good for me.

Well, listen: it's just easier, isn't it? You don't have to care about or fix the problems you can't see. No one expects you to rush to someone's aid if you don't see their injuries. The darkness is a good place to be, if you don't feel very brave or very smart or very able.

And when Jesus passes you by, if your whole world is darkness, it's easy enough to pretend you just didn't notice him at all.

But Bartimaeus chose not to stay in his darkness. More than that, he cried out to be released from it, even when everyone around him told him to shut up. He was so persistent that he caught the notice of Jesus, and when he heard those words — "Take courage; get up, Jesus is calling you!" — what did he do? He didn't stammer and run away. He had courage. He got up.

It takes courage to ask for what you need to follow Christ. Because if you ask for it, you'll get it. And then begins the terrifying, wonderful journey of discipleship — testifying to what you have seen. Life in the light, no longer sitting by the side of the road but on the road, journeying toward the greatest destination of all.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

November is called the month of All Souls. More recently, it has been called the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed. Can you tell us more about this feast and the remembrances of this month?

Answer:

November 2, the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed, dovetails with November 1st, the feast of All Saints. The saints, our models of Christian living, are one with God in heaven. All the faithful departed are those who have died with hope and trust in a loving God who calls us to greater growth and development, even beyond death. This growth and development occurs in a state of being that we have traditionally called purgatory.

While the Western Church has emphasized the cleansing and purifying nature of purgatory, the Eastern Orthodox Church has emphasized the growth and development aspect of it. Today, belief in purgatory allows one who has died in Christ to continue growing and developing before meeting God face to face. God continually invites communion with these loved ones, but some feel the need to continue growing and developing before entering into full communion with God.

These November feasts vividly remind us of the rich reality known as the communion of saints. This belief stresses the strong affirmation that the church is always one in Christ. Death does not sever any of the bonds that unite us in Christ. That is why it is a fitting practice to pray for the dead and to ask them to pray for us. Just as we do that for each other when we are alive, so, too, do we continue that bond and concern for each other even beyond death.



After Sunday masses this weekend, I shall set out for my vacation to Nigeria. It's important for me to take this opportunity to decompress, relax, and refresh my spirit to return strongest for work. Therefore, from 27 October until 15 December, I shall be on vacation. A few activities are lined-up for me already.



Callistus, my brother is getting married in early November. Then Christopher, another brother, will also take a wife by the end of November. Ruth, my cousin, will be marrying in early December. Lastly, Cornelius, the last child of eight siblings, will have a wife by February 2025. I may likely have to return for that last wedding by next year. From the look of things, the vacation is already saturated with three weddings involving dance, good food, and some fun. I ask of your prayers for my family and the spouses coming in or going out.

As I leave for vacation, please note the following for our St. Mary parish community. The Deacon Francis Staab will take charge of pastoral activities with Fr. Julius Kayiwa celebrating the mid-week masses. Early week masses and Friday masses won't be available as no priest is coming in residence. However, the Rev. Matthew Lowry, the Episcopal Vicar of the North from Flagstaff will come every weekend for masses. He will alternate that with his associate. Thanks for their generosity in coming from Macedonia to help us.

I urge you to prepare for this visit and pray along with the bishop for God's graces on our families throughout the jubilee year and always.

My joy is that my mom is waiting eagerly to spoil me with lavish dishes I have missed. I will eat the best I can and avoid gaining extra weight. Wishing you God's choicest blessing as America votes for the next president on Tuesday 5 November 2024. God bless America.

Parent(s), in order to baptize your child in our parish, please come to the Parish Office to obtain an outline describing the necessary requirements. This must be done PRIOR to scheduling the required pre-baptism class (which both the parents and the godparents must attend).

REQUIREMENTS PRIOR TO THE BAPTISM OF YOUR CHILD

Parents:

- 1) Must be a registered parishioner in our parish
- 2) Parent(s) must be baptized and submit a copy of their Confirmation certificate(s).
- 3) If the parents are married, provide a copy of their Catholic marriage certificate.*
 - 4) Parent(s) must provide a copy of their child's birth certificate.

Godparent(s) - At Least One:

- 1) Must be a practicing Catholic, following the teachings of the Catholic Faith
- 2) The Godparent must be baptized and submit a copy of their Confirmation certificate(s).
- 3) The Godparent(s), if married, must provide a copy of their Catholic marriage certificate.

Once the required documentation is received, the parent(s) and godparent(s) <u>must</u> complete the required pre-baptism class. The baptism will be scheduled <u>after</u> the required class has been completed.

*Marriage convalidation classes are available for those who are civilly married and wish to bring their marriage into full communion with the Church . Contact the Parish Office for information.


