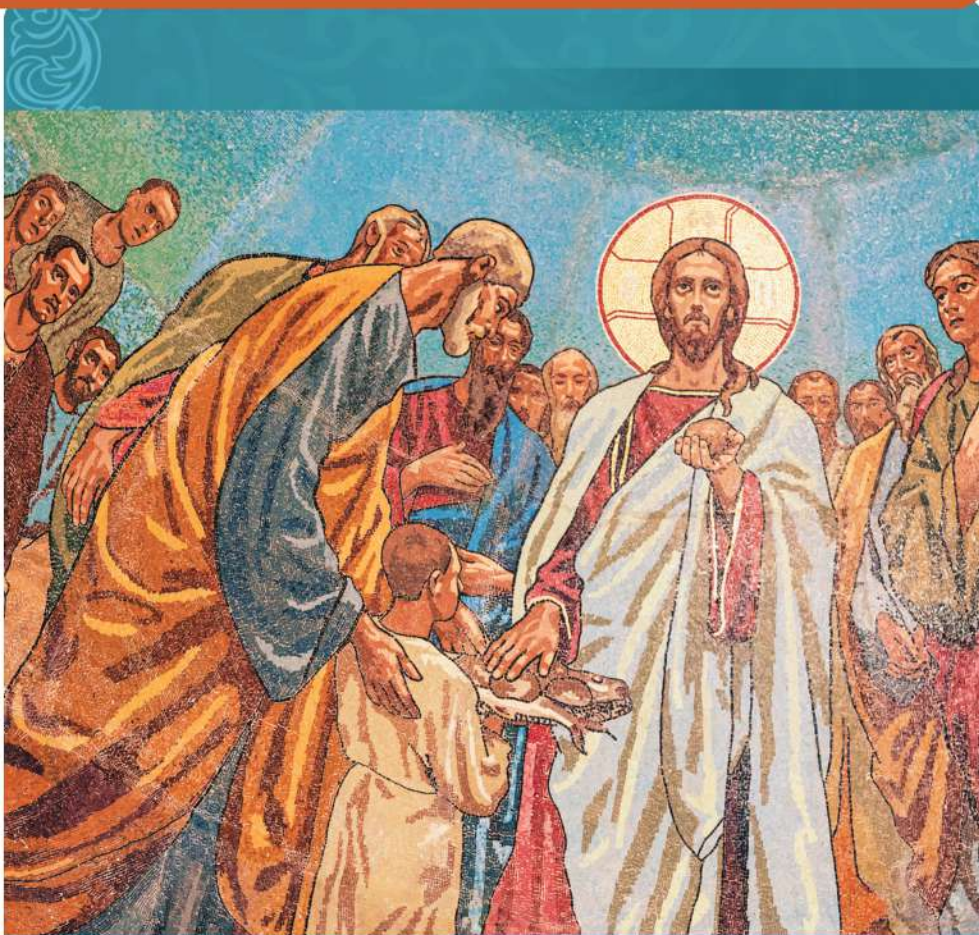

Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

In his song, "Lose Yourself," the artist Eminem raps, **"the mood all changed."**

We all know that moment when the mood changes, when life turns from lighthearted to deadly serious. That happens in today's Gospel. Jesus has just heard that John the Baptist, his cousin, forerunner, and friend, has been murdered. As Matthew tells us, **"When Jesus heard of it, he withdrew in a boat to a deserted place by himself."** Until now, he had been teaching in parables and healing quietly. But John's death signals a new phase. The shadow of the Cross begins to fall. Evil shows its teeth.

And how does Jesus respond? Not with rage or despair. He goes to a lonely place to go into deep communion with his Father. From that silence comes action. He feeds the multitude. Out of grief comes generosity. Out of sorrow, life.

This is the rhythm of every disciple's life. When tragedy or violence breaks our hearts, we face a choice. We can react, or we can retreat into prayer — like and with Christ. This is the hidden place where pain becomes compassion and compassion becomes self-gift.

Lord Jesus, when life intensifies, draw me into Your quiet strength. In that hidden place with You and the Father, turn my heartbreak into the bread of love for the world. Amen.

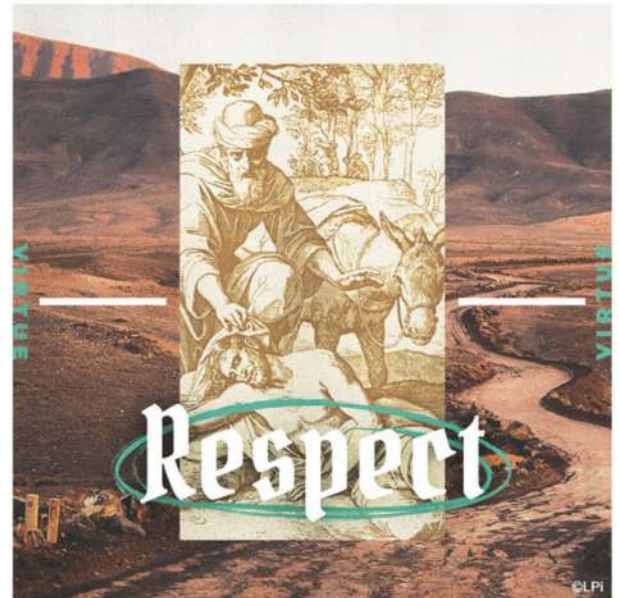
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Live The Liturgy Inspiration of the Week

Paul is convinced that nothing in this life can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. When do you feel closest to God?

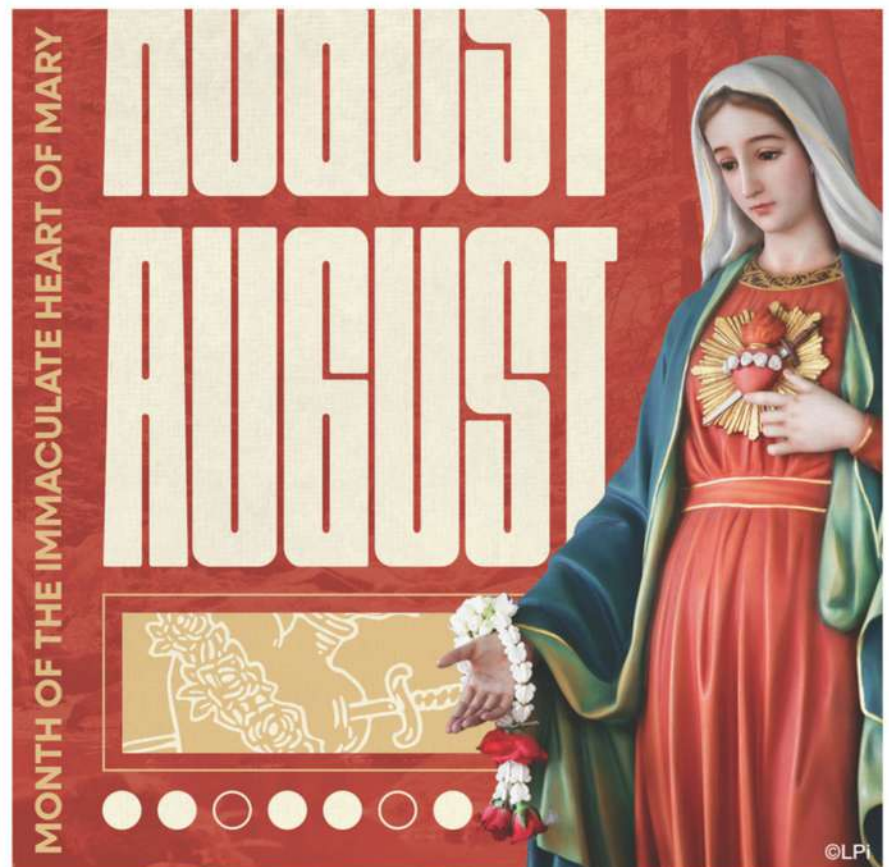
Gospel:

The Miracles We Don't See

"Why aren't there miracles anymore?"

I've heard people say this more than once. Usually, it is someone who is a believer in Christ but not a Catholic, because Catholics understand that miracles happen at every Mass, to say nothing of the other miracles the Church recognizes. But even some Catholics often find themselves wondering why it's been so long since God gave us a good show. A good sundance in the sky. A good, flashy reason to believe.

I don't know what it looked like when the loaves and the fishes were multiplied. I believe it happened, and I have envisioned it often, but I just can't picture it. Did everyone blink and there was a giant pile of food? Did they just keep finding more? Was it all the same kind of bread, or did Jesus mix it up?

I think the Gospel is deliberately vague on this to test the patience of pathologically nosy people like myself. It's not important what it looked like. If those details mattered, they would be spelled out in Scripture.

How often we find ourselves unsatisfied with the answers God has for us.

I wonder if that's what Christ was thinking when he savored those last few minutes of solitude on the boat, where he had gone to be alone after hearing the crushing news of his cousin's execution. Was he imagining the crowds gathering on shore? Was he contemplating their enormous expectations for God — for him! — and anticipating their disappointment when every wish could not be granted?

Maybe. But that's not what the Scripture says.

"His heart was moved with pity," we are told. I think of him looking at them all, so weary and uncertain and hungry. Pity — this is what he felt. Not resentment, exhaustion or frustration. Pity. And his precious heart was moved.

What a miracle. No details, no explanation. No dancing sun. But what a miracle.

Why do we do that?

Catholic Life Explained

Question:

If God is eternal and infinite, how can He have a mother? Why don't we call Mary just the mother of Jesus?

Answer:

The title of "Mary, Mother of God" can be confusing. We aren't implying that Mary existed from eternity or that she is divine herself. We aren't promoting some kind of Marian superpowers. The Church has fought for this title throughout the centuries for one simple reason: Christ's identity is at stake.

As the Church grew in the early centuries, theologians wrestled with what it meant for Jesus to be both God and man. Many distortions of his identity began to emerge. One of these was propagated by a man named Nestorius. Nestorius and his followers denied that Jesus' human nature and his divine nature were inseparable. Following that logic, Mary could have only conceived Jesus' *human* nature. But people don't give birth to a "nature." They give birth to a whole person. For Jesus, his whole person is both human and divine. In 431 A.D. the Council of Ephesus denounced Nestorius. The bishops affirmed that Jesus is both fully human and fully divine and proclaimed Mary *Theotokos*. Translating the Greek to English, that means "God-bearer." Note that this isn't "God-generator" or "God-creator." Mary bore Jesus, God and man, in her womb and gave him birth. She is mother to the whole person, the whole Jesus, and therefore Mother of God.

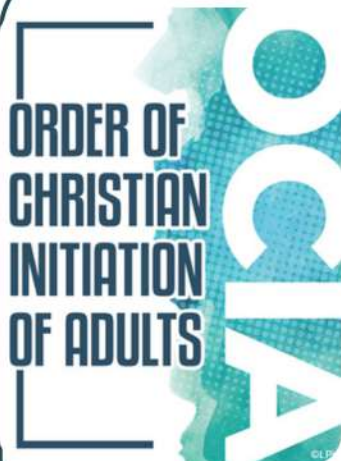

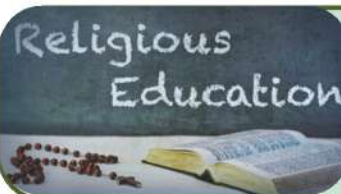
Our upcoming Fall Study program:

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Dear St. Mary's,

I want to thank you for a wonderful first year here in Kingman. We are seeing tremendous growth in our community and that brings with it many new blessings and also some new challenges. Today I want to share with you an overview of our parish financial situation. While not the only indicator of a parish's health, finances do show how I am striving to practice good stewardship of the community's resources and offering them to the Lord for the proclamation of the Gospel, fostering a relationship with Jesus Christ, and community building events to draw members of the Mystical Body of Christ together in common purpose. To that end, I have compiled this report with the help of Alex Lozano our parish bookkeeper and our Renee Periera from our parish finance council so that you can see where our parish stands financially.

Our parish's fiscal year starts July 1st and ends June 30. So, from July 1, 2025 until June 30, 2026 we saw as a community a \$61,000 increase in plate income compared to last year meaning that after subtracting expenses (which also went up) our net income was \$25,000. This means that our parish income exceeds our expenses and that is due to all of you and your generosity for which I am so grateful for. What these excess funds allow us to do is to put some away into savings but also to maintain our existing facilities including performing deferred maintenance of our facilities. Additionally, we have no debt meaning that our solid financial status and extant savings allow us to look to future endeavors including, but not limited to, expansion and renovations.

Again, thank you all for your prayers, participation, and support of our community and I look forward to walking with you where the Lord guides us. If you have any additional questions please feel free to reach out.

Estimada St. Mary's:

Quiero agradecerles por este maravilloso primer año aquí en Kingman. Estamos viendo un crecimiento tremendo en nuestra comunidad y eso trae consigo muchas nuevas bendiciones, pero también algunos nuevos desafíos. Hoy quiero compartir con ustedes un resumen de la situación financiera de nuestra parroquia. Aunque no es el único indicador de la salud de una parroquia, las finanzas sí muestran cómo me esfuerzo por administrar bien los recursos de la comunidad y ofrecerlos al Señor para la proclamación del Evangelio, el fomento de una relación con Jesucristo y la organización de eventos que fortalezcan la comunidad, con el fin de unir a los miembros del Cuerpo Místico de Cristo en un propósito común. Con ese fin, he elaborado este informe con la ayuda de Alex Lozano, nuestro contador parroquial, y de Renee Periera, de nuestro consejo financiero parroquial, para que puedan ver cuál es la situación financiera de nuestra parroquia.

El año fiscal de nuestra parroquia comienza el 1 de julio y termina el 30 de junio. Así pues, desde el 1 de julio de 2025 hasta el 30 de junio de 2026, como comunidad registramos un aumento de 61 000 dólares en los ingresos por ofrendas en comparación con el año pasado, lo que significa que, tras restar los gastos (que también aumentaron), nuestros ingresos netos fueron de 25 000 dólares. Esto significa que los ingresos de nuestra parroquia superan nuestros gastos, y eso se debe a todos ustedes y a su generosidad, por lo cual estoy muy agradecido. Estos fondos excedentes nos permiten destinar una parte a nuestros ahorros, pero también mantener nuestras instalaciones actuales, incluyendo la realización de trabajos de mantenimiento pospuestos. Además, no tenemos deudas, lo que significa que nuestra sólida situación financiera y los ahorros disponibles nos permiten pensar en proyectos futuros, incluyendo, entre otros, la expansión y las renovaciones.

Una vez más, gracias a todos por sus oraciones, su participación y su apoyo a nuestra comunidad, y espero con ilusión seguir caminando junto a ustedes por donde el Señor nos guíe. Si tienen alguna pregunta adicional, no duden en ponerse en contacto conmigo.

I will give five loaves of bread and two fish (or some other food) to the homeless shelter.

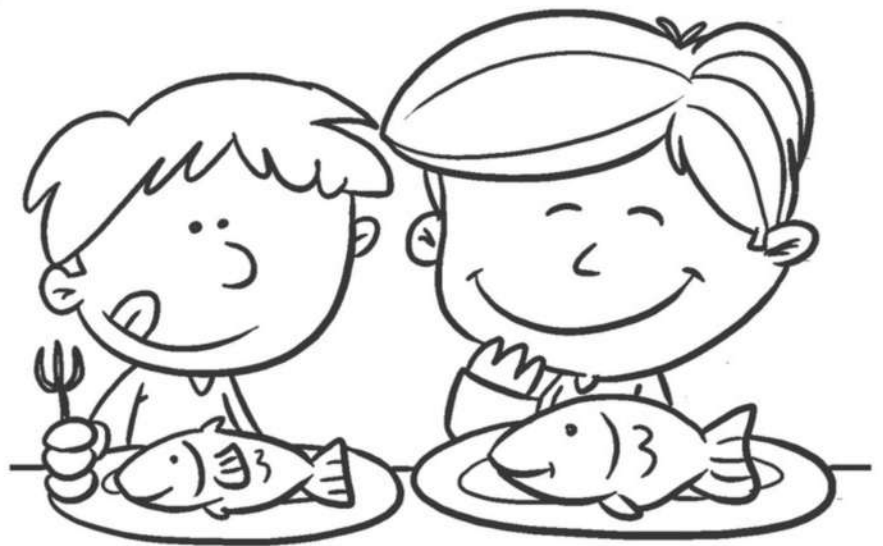
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Sharing the Gospel
